FULTON COUNTY NEWS. of old Fort Frederick, Maryland's frontier defence of 148 years ago. A monument of Indian forays and Horrible Outrage Committed in Cambria Countimes when people in Annapolis stood in fear of an invasion. It is the last remaining vestige of the French and Indian War, and is a regular quadrangle with four bastions measuring 120 yards between their salients. The walls are from 20 to 16 feet in height according to the slope of the ground, 5 feet thick at the foun-

dation, taperlug to 30 inches at the top.

"The walls are what is tecnincally called "rubble" work, bound with a very strong and enduring mortar mixed probably with hydraulic lime. In August, 1756, six months after the authority and means had been furnished by the Assembly to build the fort, it was sufficiently advanced to receive a garrison and was named Fort Frederick in honor of Frederick, the last Lord Baltimore. I may add that steps are being taken for its acquirement by the government for better preserva-






