License Notice.

IN THE COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS OF FULTON COUNTY.

It is ordered that all applications for licenses for the sale of vinous, spiritous, malt, or brewed liquors, wholesale or retail, for the year 1905, will be heard on Tuesday, the 10th day of January, 1905, at 10 o'clock a. m., at which time all persons applying or making objections to applications and petitions by evidence, petition, remonstrance or counsel.

There must be no communication at any time upon the subject, with the judges personally either by letter or any other private way.

The petition, verified by affidavit of applicant, shall be in conformity with the requirements of the act of Assembly, and judgment shall be executed in the penal sum of \$500, with no less than five reputable freeholders of the county as sureties, each of them to be a bona fide owner of real estate in the county of Fulton worth over and above all encumbrances, the sum of \$500 (or other legal security given) bond conditioned for the faithful observance of all the laws relating to the selling or furnishing of liquors, and to pay all damages which shall be recovered against the licensee, and all costs, fines and penalties which may be imposed on him under any indictment for violating said laws, and the sureties will be required to appear in Court and justify under oath.

The Court shall in all cases refuse the application whenever, in the opinion of the Court, having due regard to the character and character of the petitioner for and against the application, such license is not necessary for the accommodation of the public and the convenience of strangers and travelers, or that the applicant is not a fit person to whom such license should be granted.

Notices to be filed with the Clerk of the Court not later than Monday, the 10th day of December, 1904. Petitions and remonstrances to be filed not later than Tuesday, the 10th day of January, 1905. Non-objection cause being shown proof being made to the Court that the party holding license has violated any law of the Commonwealth relating to the sale of liquors, the Court shall, upon notice being given to the person licensed, revoke the license.
