**THE SMALLPOX ZONE.**

School Boards Did Not Organize—State Officers Coming.

Public Opinion—Tuesday. The school directors of Metal and Fannett townships met on Saturday and decided not to organize themselves into boards of health to fight the smallpox contagion now raging in these townships. The action which will now be taken by the state health officers will be watched with interest.

Dr. Lee, state secretary, has dispatched Dr. Batt, state health officer at large, to the scene of the epidemic, but Dr. Batt has been compelled to remain at home because of illness. When he has sufficiently recovered he will go to Dry Run and from there superintend the quarantines. Dr. Shope, Fannettsburg, has been in communication with the state authorities as has the Franklin county health officer, Dr. H. X. Bonbrake, of this place.

Ten new cases have been reported since last Friday.
