The Republican County Convention was called to order in the Court House at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon by acting chairman Dr. A. D. Dalbey, Secretary, Ed. D. Shimer read the call, and the following organization was effected: Chairman, Hon. D. H. Patterson; secretaries, Clarence R. Akers, of Brush Creek and B. Moody Stewart, of Wells.

On call of roll the following delegates were found to be present: Ayr—D. H. Patterson and A. K. Nesbit; Beltast—G. W. Morton and B. A. Truax; Bethel—W. H. Charlton; Brush Creek—Clarence R. Akers and Clarence Stoner; Dublin—Bennie Wilds and Geo. C. Fraker; Licking Creek—R. R. Hann and M. H. Hollenshead; McConnellsburg—Dr. J. W. Mosser and W. H. Nesbit; Taylor—Josiah Witter and Howard Barnett; Thompson—Jacob Powell; Tod—David Rotz and W. H. Wible; Union—Not represented; Wells—A. O. Griffith and B. M. Stewart.

Obed T. Mellott of Belfast, was nominated by acclamation for associate judge.

For Commissioner, C. R. Akers presented the name of J. R. Jackson of Brush Creek; Geo. Fraker nominated Grant Baker of Dublin; Bennie Wilds nominated J. D. Stevens, and Dr. Mosser, S. A. Nesbit of McConnellsburg. Mr. Burkhardt did not allow his name to come before the convention. A ballot was taken which gave Jackson 19, Nesbit 14 and Stevens 11—Baker having released his delegates.

C. C. Rotz and W. Grant Wink were nominated by acclamation for county auditors.

No one was placed on the ticket for prothonotary or district attorney.

L. H. Wible, Esq., was elected chairman of the county committee for the ensuing year, and J. S. Harris, secretary.
