FULTON COUNTY DEVELOPMENT COMPANY

I signed for \$1,000. My policy in the Friends Cove expired last spring. Feeling a little uneasy, I went and asked for my policy in the Fulton. Was told they were not home from the printer, but would be given me in proper time. The policies went into effect June 1st. My property was destroyed June 13th. The Company refused to pay me. Had I not supposed I had protection in the Fulton I would have staid with the Friends Cove. Mr. Lake was at my house to renew my policy. I told him I wanted to patronize home enterprise.—Should I not be paid?
