William Brubaker of Knobsville, Fatal- To Enforce the Law Compelling Pupils to ly Injured by Explosion of Gas Tank.

William Brubaker, a well known citizen of this county, was fatally injured at Quincy, Franklin county, last Wednesday evening, about 6 o'clock.

That evening Mr. Brubaker was making the gas which is used to illuminate the machine, a mixture of hydrogen and oxygen, and had the various chemicals necessarv in an iron tank in the tent in which the family cooked and lived. Through some error, likely, the tank exploded and the metal parts flew about many of them striking the man in the face and body. His clothing also caught fire and ne probably inhaled some of the flames.
