Peckman Mill Burned Last Friday Morning at a Loss of \$10,000.

Williamson, on the Cumberland Valley railroad, eight miles from Mercersburg, was visited by disastrous fire last Friday morning, at which time the big flouring mill of S. F. Peckman was destroyed with five thousand bushels of wheat and a carload of flour ready for shipment. The loss is estimated at \$10,000. Flames were discovered issuing out of the third floor of the mill about 3 o'clock, while the mill was in operation. It is believed that overheated machinery started the blaze.

The mill was doing a thriving business and was located in the midst of a prosperous farming community.

It is reported that Mr. Peckman intends to rebuild the burned structure.
