THE FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

The State Workers Here, and Much Local Interest Manifested.

Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather, a fair number of persons were present at the opening session of the Farmers' Institute in the Court House yesterday afternoon.

The large auditorium was comfortably filled last evening, and the session to day promises to be full of interest.

Rev. Dr. Wm. West, conducted the devotional exercises at the opening of yesterday afternoon's session. After this Prof. Francis Mengas of York, Pa., gave an excellent talk on "How the Farmers' Institute in the Agricultural Institute of Pennsylvania," he spoke forcefully of the difficulty of accomplishing much good without the co-operation of the farmers and of the good done in the matter of fertilizers, dairying, liming, bacteria, and many other practical subjects to which the institute has helped us.

The talk brought out much discussion. Hon. Jno. P. Sipes took up the next period with a talk on "How to Advance the Material Interest of Fulton County."

Mr. Sipes gives to the Farmers' Institute largely the credit of having increased the value of farm property in the United States in the last five years to the amount of over \$4,000,000,000.

In the way of public improvements—railroads, development of mineral deposits, &c., the speaker thinks that the citizens should be willing to sacrifice something toward that end.

Mr. R. F. Schwarz was then introduced and emphasized the remarks of the preceding speaker in his talk on "The New Road Law and the Farmers under it."

Mr. Schwarz reviewed the legislature that has led to the passage of the present law and showed how good roads can be made, either under the old law or the new, and how the law can be abused.

The speaker also urged that all public roads should be continuous and should be laid out to pass through the principal towns and secure the best roads to the greatest number.

Mr. Norman Weller of the Department of Economic Zoology was then introduced and made a few remarks explanatory of the work of the Department and his presence in Fulton county in the interest of the destruction of the San Jose Scale.
