### Miss Elizabeth Detrich.

Miss Elizabeth Detrich, sister of the late H. H. Detrich, of this place, and aunt of Mrs. Robert N. Fryman, of the Cove, died at her home in Waynesboro, as told by the following clipped from a Waynesboro paper:

"She was stricken with paralysis while walking in the yard at her premises about noon last Thursday, and never regained consciousness except to a partial extent Sunday morning.

She had been in her usual sturdy health until visited by the paralytic stroke, and was looking forward with fondest anticipations to the completion of a new dwelling house.

Miss Detrich was born 70 years ago, on the site of the residence in which she died. She was the daughter of George Detrich and was the last member of her family. Her brothers and sisters, who preceded her to the grave, were Matthias, David M. and Henry Detrich, and Misses Louisa and Ella Detrich. Two sisters-in-law, Mrs. Catherine B. Detrich, south of town, and Mrs. Martha Detrich, near Letersburg, survive her, as do two nieces, Mrs. Alice Smith, daughter of Mrs. Martha Detrich, and Mrs. Ella Fryman, McConnellsburg.

Miss Detrich was an unassuming woman, but full of good works and kindly deeds for her friends. She was a most helpful neighbor and always ready to lend any aid that was within her power. Especially was she quick to respond to the call of the sick and to minister unto them. Her death will cause sincere mourning in many families. She was a member of Trinity Reformed church.

Funeral services over the remains of Miss Elizabeth Detrich were held at her late residence on Cleveland avenue at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Many friends of the deceased were present and a number of floral emblems testified to the esteem in which the aged and kindly woman was held.

Rev. F. F. Bahner, D. D., pastor of Miss Detrich, conducted the services and delivered an address.

Dr. Bahner officiated at the funerals of Miss Detrich's mother and her sister, and with the obsequies of today, buried the last of the family. The theme of his address was most appropriate. It was, "A Home Transplanted from Earth to Heaven." Interment was made in Green Hill cemetery.
