The sessions of the respective branches on Wednesday were also short.

The bills to pay the Secretary of the Commonwealth \$10,000 a year and abolishing their fees were reported to the House today with a favorable recommendation.

These officers have been getting the innocent looking salaries of \$4,000 and \$3,000 respectively, but there has been a string attached.

It was shown that the Secretary of the Commonwealth last year in addition to his salary drew in 'fees' \$28,000, thus making the emoluments of his office more than three times that of the salary of the Governor.

State Treasurer Mathews threw consternation into the ranks of the impecunious legislators—and there are many of them attending this session—by announcing that he would make no advances to them on their salaries.

It has been the practice in regular sessions for legislators to draw a portion of their salaries at any time during the term and it was thought by every one that this practice would prevail at this session.

The State Treasurer, however, got an opinion from the Attorney General and the members who are not too well fixed are trying to make arrangements with banks to take their notes for moderate advances until the end of the session or until an appropriation bill is passed.

Both branches adjourned Thursday for a recess until Monday evening of this week.

In addition, United States, State, county or municipal bonds equal to the amount of deposit must be assigned to the Treasurer. If a bank fails to honor a check or draft on the Treasurer the bonds may be sold in the open market on ten days' notice.

The Treasurer must advertise for bids from banks wishing to become State depositories. The deposit is limited to one-half of the capital stock and surplus. The minimum rate of interest is fixed at 2 per cent. The highest bidders are to be selected.

Three primary election bills were introduced in the House by Messrs. Cook, of Allegheny; Ammerman, of Montour, and Hitchcock, of Tioga.

The Cook bill provides for the holding of the general primaries under the regular election officers, members of all political parties, voting for their respective candidates on the same day.

The Republican or Democrat or any other political partisan who wants to run for nomination to office on a party ticket must file his intention with the Secretary of the Commonwealth if he wants a State office, or with the County Commissioners if he aspires to a county, municipal, borough or township elective office.
