COUNTY MUST BEAR THE COST.

Where Persons Bitten by Mad Dogs are Too Poor to Pay for Treatment,

The cases of hydrophobia or rables that have been reported in different parts of the State receptiy have prompted Commissioner of Health, Samuel G. Dixon to call attention to an act passed by the last legislature and approved by Governor Pennypacker, March 31, 1905, as the act seems to be apparently little known. It provides for furnishing treatment to needy persons who have been bitten by mad dogs and reads as follows:
