### First Told About God.

A village in Mexico of 1,000 souls, not one of whom had heard of a God-such is the story told of the Christian church at Monterey, says the Mexican Herald. Nestling in a deep valley 28 miles from Saltillo and shut off from the rest of the world by high and impassable cliffs, the pure Indians have lived for generations still worshiping their stone and wooden images and utterly unlearned in everything pertaining to a Supreme Being, according to Mr. Inman, who has written to friends in the city of Mexico concerning his strange find. Santo Domingo is what the town is called, though why and wherefore none of the elders of that village could tell. It had been called that for generations and more and they did not know the insignificance of the words.


