B. C. LAMBERSON, Arbor Days Proclaimed.

Governor Pennypacker has issued the following Arbor Day proclamation:

"Since the seventeenth of January, the Forestry Reservation Commission have bought four hundred and twenty thousand, seven hundred and twenty-six acres of forest lands, and the State now holds in all seven hundred and fifty-three thousand, seven hundred and forty-one acres of such lands, and this commission is doing much to preserve and maintain our forests and our streams. It behooves every citizen who cares for the welfare of the commonwealth to lend assistance and to give encouragement to this important work. The lives of men and of trees are so interwoven that without the other neither can exist. The growth of the grove means both happiness and benefit to mankind.

In order that all of our citizens men, women and children, may participate in the pleasure and profit of planting trees, I, Samuel W. Pennypacker, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby, in accordance with law, issue this my proclamation, designating Friday, the sixth day of April, and Friday, the twentieth day of April, A. D. 1906, to be observed as Arbor Days throughout the Commonwealth."

Two days are set apart in order that whichever may be best suited to the climate of the locality may be selected.
