and steel manufactures, cars and car-riages, manufactures of wood, mineral oils and leather. Wheat and wheat flour exports increased about \$34,000,000, com tearly \$20,000,000; cats over \$10,000,000

and provisions \$33,000,000. On the import side, all groups show as increase except articles of food, which in the eight months, ended with Feb-ruary, 1000, amounted to but \$171,000.-000, against \$184,000,000 for the same time last year. Coffee shows a fall of nearly \$12,000,000, and sugar \$5,000,000. The most remarkable increase in the imports, says the bulletin, occurs in manu-facturers' materials, which show a tota gain of over 40,000,000 for the eight months of 1906, as compared with the ame period of 1005.
