New Women Citizens.

That a woman who directs a home and trains up children is a responsible citizen with a large share of state business to perform is suggested by the title of a series of articles begun in The New Woman's Magazine for April. "The Evolution of Our Women Citizens: I. Their Arrival," deals with the landing at Ellis Island of women from Russia, Italy, Germany, and other peasant-producing European states; and considers them as the raw material out of which American women citizens, with American aims and ideals are to be made. The writer, Miss Elizabeth Howard Westwood, tells of the inducements offered to emigrant women to come to America, of the dangers they have to meet on landing, of the protection societies which have sprung up to care for defenseless women and girls, of the fathers and husbands and friends who meet them at the end of their painful steamer journey. Interesting realistic photographs are shown. The article is optimistic concerning the material advantages found by emigrants in this country. After recounting the story of the daughter of a Scottish lord, who found in managing the hand-embroiderie of an American silk stocking factory the prop of falling fortune, the writer says: "If American opportunities can thus induce the high class foreigner woman to forsake comfortable home, family ties, social position—what must be the lure with which it calls to the woman who has nothing but misery to lose and everything that makes life livable to win." One cannot but acknowledge, however, in observing the doubtful Paradise of our city slums, that much has yet to be done before our peasant immigrants do more than grapple with a new set of problems in undertaking the lot of American citizenship.

Rev. Sir: Three churches in Baldwinville, N. Y., have had their first lesson in Devoe.

A FUTURE FOR FULTON.

Keep Your Ear to The Ground and Await Developments—A Glance Backward and A Glance Ahead.

The panic of 1893, according to Hon. D. Hunter Patterson, of Webster Mills, Fulton county, squashed the project to build a trolley line from Mercersburg to the top of the mountain and to McConnellsburg—a hotel on the peak and a park at Buchanan's birthplace. The subscriptions for the enterprise had about all been subscribed. The then President of the C. V. R. R., the late Col. T. B. Kennedy, had agreed to take twenty-five per cent. of the stock, for the reason that the road would be a good feeder to the C. V.

With the prospect that the next legislature will give trolley companies right to carry freight, Mr. Patterson thinks there ought to be sufficient inducement to some one to build a trolley road into his county to connect with a Franklin county line.

Mr. Patterson, who is wide-awake and a student of conditions, remarked to the Waynesboro "Zephyr" man that he believed Fulton county contained possibilities for the development of very profitable agricultural undertakings. The mountain sides are admirably adapted for growing tomatoes, for instance. The best tomatoes are obtained on the hill sides, experience has shown.

Fulton county has never grown fruit on a large scale and it is believed there ought to be very profitable orchards there in a few years if fruit culture was inaugurated. -People's Register.
