To Fumigate Money.

The Health officer, Dr. Dixon, of Harrisburg, has issued a letter calling upon bank officials throughout the State to assist him in checking the spread of disease by taking the precaution to fumigate money before it passes out of the bank's hands.

"As the germs of disease are found on money in circulation, the Department of Health respectfully suggests and requests that you co operate with it in the protection of the health of our people by fumigating all money received by your bank before it is again put in circulation. Such a precautionary measure, I am confident, will avoid many cases of sickness and death in your community.

"The disinfection of money may be accomplished by spraying with a formaldehyde solution or exposing to the fumes of formaldehyde gas."

Pension Law.

The age limit pension bill passed by both houses of congress has become a law. Under its provisions when a soldier of the Civil War arrives at the age of 60 years, he is allowed \$6 per month without examination as to disability. At 61 he gets \$8; at 70 years he is allowed \$12. The measure does away with any question as to disability, and gives every soldier a pension regardless of disease contracted in the war or since that time.
