Didn't Waste Words.
In view of the fun which the German comic papers are always making about the brevity of speech of the army officers in addressing the rank and file, it may be well to explain, says a writer in the New York Tribune, that this fashion dates from the days of that most taciturn and silent of Prussian rulers, Frederick William III, great-grandfather of the present Kaiser. His utterances were of the briefest sort.
On one occasion, while staying at the Austrian baths at Teplitz, in 1829, he was informed by one of his generals in attendance that there was sojourning at Teplitz a Hungarian magnate equally celebrated for his taciturnity. The King expressed the desire to see him by means of the brief command, "Bring him in!"

An interview was arranged without the Hungarian being informed of the identity of the elderly German officer whom he was about to meet.
The King began the conversation with the monosyllabic inquiry, "Bath?" to which the other replied equally briefly, "Drink," meaning, of course, that he took the waters internally.
"Militaire?" continued the King wishing to know if the Magyar was an officer in the army. To this question the other responded shaking his head, "Lagnate," that being the title given to the members of the Chamber of Peers at Budapest.
"Ah!" said the King.
"General?" inquired the magnate.
"King," said Frederick William III by way of indicating his rank. The Hungarian nobleman doffed his bonnet, and, with the word "Compliments," bowed and withdrew.

The King himself saluted, and thus brought to a close one of the most laconic interviews that have ever taken place between a sovereign and a noble.
The example thus set by the old King became the fad among the German army officers, but it cannot be said that it appeals to the present Emperor, who is, perhaps, the last monarch in Christendom whom one would accuse of being disposed to brevity of speech.

Democratic Convention.
The Democratic County Convention met in the Court House, in McConnellsburg, on Tuesday at 11 o'clock, and was called to order by Chairman McDonough. On motion of J. W. Hoop, Dr. H. S. Wishart was chosen president and Tolbert Shank and J. H. H. Lewis were elected secretaries. On motion of Geo. A. Harris, esq., a committee on credentials was appointed consisting of J. W. Hoop, E. O. Kesselring, Logue Hess and Adam Shank.

On motion the convention decided to sit with closed doors.
Adjourned to meet at 1:30 p. m. The convention reconvened at 1:30 p. m.
Hon. Jno. P. Sipes was nominated for the legislature. On call of the roll of delegates, it was found that he had the support of every one present. J. H. H. Lewis then placed in nomination for Jury Commissioner, Jacob L. Hess of Belfast, and W. L. Sprowl, the name of A. C. Truax, of the same township. A ballot being taken it was found that Mr. Truax had 16 votes, and Mr. Hess, 5.
Mr. Truax was declared the nominee.

J. H. H. Lewis, W. L. Sprowl, and W. H. Nelson were elected senatorial delegates; Geo. B. Daniels, S. M. Robinson, and B. C. Lamberson were elected congressional conferees, and Lewis Harris delegate to the State Convention. Jas. A. McDonough was re-elected County Chairman.

RESOLUTIONS.
The committee on resolutions then reported the following, which were enthusiastically adopted:
The Democratic party of Fulton County in convention assembled declares that pledging assent to adherence to sound democratic principles and policies as enunciated by the National and State conventions from time to time, it resolves as follows:
1. That it is in favor of legislation giving trolley companies the same powers and privileges that steam railroad companies enjoy particularly the right of eminent domain and the right to carry freight.
2. That it favors a law requiring railroad, telegraph, telephone and pipe line companies to pay local taxes on their franchises and property to the counties and townships through which they pass.
3. That it is in favor of legislation enabling the counties of the State to retain all the personal property and license taxes levied by each.
4. That it favors larger appropriations by the State for the improvement of the highways subject any conditions requiring the townships to levy and collect a certain rate in order to obtain a part of such appropriation.
5. That it favors larger appropriations to the public schools and such legislation as will apply the appropriation so as to relieve the poorer school districts from their present excessive burden.
6. That it favors legislation that will, by appropriate penalties for that purpose, compel the railroad companies to obey the provisions of the constitution and give every shipper, great or small, an equal deal.
7. That it is in favor of a uniform railroad passenger rate of two cents per mile.
8. That it endorses the course of the Hon. Jno. P. Sipes, representative in the legislature, at both the regular and extra sessions, particularly for his efforts to bring relief to the grammar school districts, and for trolley
