FRANKLIN MILLS.

Thursday of last week a heavy storm of wind, rain and hail visited this part of the county, beginning at what is known as Deneens Gap, passing over Franklin Mills and going in the direction of Warfordsburg, keeping a little to the left of Hancock, blowing down timber, unroofing buildings, and scattering wheat shocks over the fields, and in the vicinity of Warfordsburg on the farm of W. B. Ranck halfstones were as large as walnuts and did much damage to cornfields in its path. A cornfield of Stillwell Belford, tenant on the farm of James Stigers, between Warfordsburg and Hancock, was badly damaged; also the Kirk Brothers, Rank, and others. The house in which Baltus Stigers lives at Franklin Mills was struck at its northern gable. The electric current followed the boxing down to the corner, tore off the weatherboarding and plastering in the room down into the kitchen tearing out the window and frame. Mr. Stigers was sitting by the window at the time, and was badly shaken up, but suffered no serious results.

The storm kept on in the evening and of its course in the direction of Baltimore doing lots of damage.

This storm arrived on schedule time as predicted by Rev. Irl R. Hicks, and was heavily charged with electrical currents. It struck a cherry tree in the yard at the home of Mrs. Maria Spencer, near Dot.

The heavy downpour of rain in some instances washed fields and protected the ground so that the cornfields have the appearance of road beds and need tilling to loosen up the ground.
