**THIS FLAG NOW HAS 46 STARS.**

Beautiful Indian Maiden from Oklahoma Affixed New One at Carlisle School.

To the Carlisle Indian Schools belongs the distinction of having the first flag in the east with the full forty six stars. Major Mercer, superintendent of the Carlisle School, last Wednesday evening raised the new flag at one of the most beautiful ceremonies ever seen here.

After 6 o'clock the Carlisle Indian Band led to the school campus four troops of Indian youths in the old regulation army blue uniforms, and carrying the army rifles, together with several hundred Indian maidens, attired in light blue gowns.

The girls stood in long lines at ease during the elaborate ceremony of dress parade, until the time arrived for raising the Stars and stripes. As Captain Fritz Hendricks, Oklahoma, and Sergeant Long, Indian Territory, held the enormous garrison flag aloft, Miss Eudora Cook, a strikingly beautiful Indian maiden from Oklahoma, affixed a large white star in the lower left hand corner of the blue field, and the newly created emblem soared aloft as the school sang "My Country 'Tis of Thee." As the flag reached the top of the towering flag staff, the band and the school broke into "The Star Spangled Banner. At sunset the emblem was lowered to the national air.

In the foreground during the ceremony fifteen young men and eighteen girls from Oklahoma and Indian Territory were arranged in a conspicuous position as honored guests. Miss Cook, wearing the national colors, occupied a staff officer's position during the review which followed the dress parade.

**The Age of an Egg.**

A simple method of finding out the age of an egg is by means of the air space which is situated towards the broad end of the shell. If the egg is held up between the hands before a light in a dark room the air space can be easily discerned, and by its size the age can be determined. In a perfectly fresh egg the air space is very small, but as age increases it extends, until when the egg is three weeks old the air space occupies about a sixth of the entire contents. With practice the age can be told to within twenty-four hours.—Agricultural Economist.

**100,000 Bushels of Grain.**

The Mabbatt elevators A and B, located at Archer avenue and Wood street, Chicago, owned by George A. Seaverns, and occupied by J. S. Templeton, grain brokers, were destroyed by fire last week. The buildings were four-story structures and contained 10,000 bushels of grain. So great was the heat that three adjacent buildings were destroyed, and twenty-five families were driven from their homes. Several explosions, which shook the surrounding buildings, followed soon after the fire was discovered. Spontaneous combustion in the dust room is supposed to have been the cause of the fire. The loss to the elevators and their contents is estimated at \$250,000.
