It has been discovered that apples wrapped in newspapers will keep all winter, the paper excluding the damp. Care should be taken, however, that subscription should be paid, or the dampness in the paper from what is dew might spoil the fruit.

In Chambersburg last year there were 181 deaths—males 93, females 88—and 240 births—males 128, females 112—according to the report of the board of health. Council cut the appropriation to the board from \$200 to \$100.

In the wild nut contest of the American Agriculturist, a Franklin county resident, Eunice S. Park, was awarded the second prize for large hickory nuts. The specimen he offered measured 4 1/2 by 3 1/2 inches; cleavage, fair; shell, rather thick; kernel, good color and splendid quality.

Brinton Bickley believes he has discovered a coal vein on his farm near Greencastle. The vein is two feet wide and has been dug to a depth of three feet, but it is not known how deep it is. The coal burns well, but is very gassy. Mr. Bickley expects to have experts look at his mine in the near future.

People should take care about sending the so-called comic postal cards. Any such containing an evident slur, even though it be based upon fact, is open to prosecution for improper use of the mails, for which the penalty is fine and imprisonment. Agents of the postal department will ferret out all such cases of which they receive information.

Isaac Conner, an aged resident near Mattie, Bedford county, was found dead near his home, on last Wednesday evening about five o'clock. He had been in his usual health and started for the barn to feed his stock. Not returning his daughter started to look for him and found him lying dead between the house and barn. Mr. Conner was aged about 80 years and was a veteran of the Civil War.

Reuben Deshong, of Deshler, O., who is visiting his father, Morgan Deshong, and other of his old time friends in this county, spent a few hours in town last Thursday. Mr. Deshong is a prosperous Buckeye farmer, and lives in a neighborhood containing several Licking Creek township people, among whom are Abram and Peter—brothers—and John, Martin, and George—sons—of Uriah W. Kline, of this county; also, H. J. Mellott, James McDonald, and Charlie Wink. Reuben says that these people are all well, and getting along well, and thinks it is a nice country in which to live.

A bill introduced by State Senator Tustin to reorganize the State Banking Department provides, among other things, for a Commissioner, with a salary of \$10,000 a year, and for two Deputy Commissioners, with respective salaries of \$2500 and \$1800. Experience has shown that in such department organization the deputy does the work for a small salary, while the chief Commissioner is a sinecurist and absentee. If there are to be Deputy Commissioners of Banking the \$10,000 salary of the Commissioner for doing nothing is twice as large as it should be. Without these deputies the salary would not be very unreasonable for such an office.
