Rowe, October 7, 1849, who died September 24, 1882, at the age of 34 years. To them were born 8 children—five daughters and three sons: Mary, Eliza, Susan, Sarah, Elizabeth, Amos, George, and Henry—only two of whom survive, namely, Mary, wife of James Morts, of Clear Ridge, and Henry, of Wells Valley, at whose home mother Anderson lived for many years, and died at that place. She was married the second time to William Anderson, better known as "Miller Bill," of Wells Valley, who preceded her to the grave. Grandmother Anderson was an excellent christian woman, haying professed religion at the age of 16, and united with the M. E. church, devoting 60 years of her life to the work of her Master, which is a legacy worth more than all of Rockefeller's millions. She, living the life of the righteous, is now reaping her reward. She had been confined to her bed for a year or more, and was not only willing but anxious and ready to go. Her remains were interred in the U. S. cemetery at Wells Valley, on Sunday, 7th, where an excellent sermon was delivered by her pastor, Rev. Forest, of the M. E. church, from the text "I desire a better country."

Miss Hilda Wishart, of Huntingdon, to her grand parents Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Wishart.

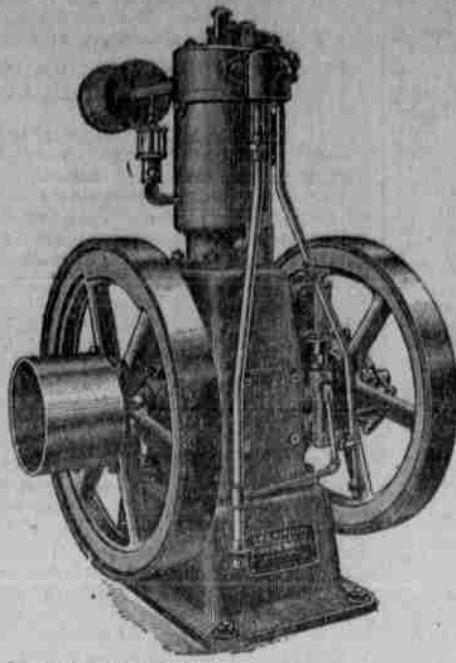
