Spools to Cost Ten, Not Five Cents, and Trust is Biased.

The increased cost of commodities has struck the housewife. Cotton thread, until a short time ago the most stable in price of all the staples, selling the country over for 5 cents a spool, is to be advanced again, so that the retail price will be 10 cents. On May 29 there was an advance which brought the retail price to 6 and 7 cents. Cotton thread for domestic use is manufactured almost exclusively by a trust.
