Light From Corn Cobs.
 It is reported that a Cleveland
 chemist has perfected a method
 of securing illuminating gas from
 corn cobs, stalks and straw. The
 process is very similar to that
 employed in manufacturing gas
 from coal. The heating power
 of this gas is said to be much
 greater than that of coal gas, and
 it is believed that eventually it
 can be manufactured with such
 economy as to permit of its being
 sold at 50 cents per 1000 feet.
 Thirty per cent. of the original
 weight of the material remains
 after the gas is extracted, and
 this can be used to feed the boil-
 ers. The scientific name of the
 new product is "grammeous"
 gas, or in common parlance it is
 corn gas.
