Every person occupying office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or not, or a subordinate officer or agent, who is, or shall be, employed under the legislative, executive or judicial department of this State or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the senate or common council of any city or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law prohibited from exercising, at the same time, the office or appointment of Justice, Inspector or Clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and no Inspector, Judge or other officer of any such election, shall be eligible to any office to be thus voted for, except that of election officer.

QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS

Every male citizen twenty-one years of age possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections: First, he shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second, he shall have resided in the State one year (or if having previously been a qualified elector or voter, he shall have resided in the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, within six months) immediately preceding the election. Fourth, if twenty-one years of age or upwards he shall have paid within two years a State or County tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election. State Constitution, Article VIII, section 1.
