THE SABBATH.

Some Results of Last Sabbath Of observance by Professing Christians.

(Continued from 6-st page.) loses the special blessing promised Isa. 58:13 "If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day; and call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable; and shalt honor him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words: Thet shalt thou delight thyself in. Lord; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father; for the mouth of the God hath spoken it."

They shall delight themselves in their God, they shall occupy the high places of the earth, they shall feed upon the abundance of the heritage of Jacob: a wondrous three fold blessing to those who, laying aside their own pleasure, devote the Lord's Day to his honor and service.

Such are some of the results to the Christian: What are the results to the Church: The church is made up of individual Christians. Obviously, those things that affect the individual Christians, affect the organization. The strength of the individual is the strength of the Church; the weakness of the individual is the weakness of the church. In so far as its members are deeply, vitally interested in the eternal verities; in so far, as they are in close communion with the Father, are careful to observe the ordinances of grace and to seek the blessings of a consecrated Sabbath; in so far as they are jealously striving to live in imitation of their divine Master in just so far as is a church a source of blessing. But whenever the individual members of a church neglect its ordinances, become careless of their way of spending the Sabbath and lukewarm in their aspirations after godliness or God-like-ness; when these things are true of its members a church has lost its power and value to the world. In the Revelation of St. John we find these words addressed to the church of the Laodiceans: "I know thy works that thou art neither cold nor hot: I would thou wert cold or hot. So then because thou art lukewarm and neither cold nor hot, I will spew thee out of my mouth." I ro. 3: 15.

What, finally, are the results to the world at large of careless Christian observance of the Sabbath; I would say the results are two fold: first, the release from the restraining influence of a strong Sabbath sentiment. You know and I know that evil halts and hesitates to expose itself in the presence of a godly man. Even so, the evil of Sabbath desecration is encouraged by the indifference and secret sympathy of the lax Christian. In this, as in other things, he is his brother's keeper.

Second: the world at large suffers the loss of a praiseworthy example. Again and again we hear: "So and so is a church member and he swears worse than I do" or "Blank is a member of the church and I'm sure he goes visiting on Sabbath and gossips as much as anybody". What about it, fellow Christian? Have we "so learned Christ"? Is that the way we measure up to the standard Christ set for us when he said, "Ye are the light of the world a city that is set on a hill cannot be hid" "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

Such, I believe, are some of the results of Ex Sabbath observance by professing Christians. All are deplorable; ignorance, weakness, and loss of blessing to the individual Christian; loss of power and prestige to the church; and loss of the restraint and inspiration of a good example to the world at large. This is the day which the Lord hath made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.
