Mr. Mellott was an inoffensive citizen, and always enjoyed the respect of his neighbors and f. iends. He had re cently been making his home with his sou in law George C. Ensley.

Ilis wife died several years ugo, and he is survived now by three children, Lottie, wife of Reuben Mellott, of Johnstown; Maggie, wife of William Deshong, of Chicago, and Nellie, wife of George Kauffman, of Belfast township.

Mr. Mellott was an honorably discharged soldier of the Civil War.
