EMBEZZLERS BRED ON RACE TRACKS

Employers' Money and Trust Funds Used to Fill the Satchels of the Book Makers.—Trail of Crime Leads to the Betting Rings, Where Gambling Furnishes the Incentive For Theft.

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New York City.—Analyses of the records of embezzlement by fidelity officers of the surety companies, the men best competent to trace these crimes to their source, disclose race track gambling as the chief cause of this form of robbery.

The figures for the past eight years have led to the acceptance of thirty-five per cent. as a moderate estimate of the proportion of embezzlements attributable to the luring into the betting rings of men who have access to other men's money.

Of the \$1,476,273 embezzled in this State in 1907, \$446,081, or thirty-two per cent., was traced to the fat and bulging satchels of the book-makers, and the facts as to many of the individual embezzlements are lacking. These doubtless would increase the amount of stealing due to gambling on horse races.

USE ELECTRICITY ON SAVAGES

Novel Method Adopted by Japanese to Exterminate Formosan Head Hunters.

San Francisco.—The extermination of savage, murderous head hunters by electricity is the latest novelty introduced by the Japanese in Formosa, according to Walter Clifton, manager of a Formosan mercantile company, who arrived here recently on the Japanese liner America Maru.

"These head hunters," said Clifton, "number about one hundred thousand and infest the entire eastern coast of the island. All efforts to civilize them have failed. They recently inveigled a party of three hundred Chinese and Japanese into an ambush, on the pretense of showing some treasure, and killed all but three."

"Large bodies of troops were sent out, and now when a company of head hunters is located the place is surrounded by a wire fence. The wires are charged with electricity. The soldiers begin to shoot; the savages stampede, and then the dead wires get those that the bullets miss."

WOULD USE JAIL INSTEAD OF FINES

Toledo Judge Gathers New Ideas by Spending Day as Common Prisoner.—Determinate Sentence Not Favored.

Toledo, Ohio.—James Austin, Jr., a police judge, of Toledo, has just flashed a sentence of one day in the city workhouse, imposed by himself while on the bench this week. Judge Austin has been anxious to learn from experience the exact meaning of a workhouse sentence, and arranged himself on a technical charge of "curiosity" going to the workhouse in the patrol wagon the same as a common prisoner.

"As I stood handcuffed ready to get into the patrol wagon with the crowd of Market Square loafers making fun of me and of my situation," he said, after his experience, "I was simply enduring what I had seen many a poor victim have to suffer in days gone by. The time I spent in my own society in the cell has rectified my former views of time, for I know there are more than sixty minutes in an hour when you spend that hour in a cell, with nothing to smoke, chew, drink, read or write, and only the slant of the shadows in the cell to let you know what time it is. I found our workhouse well warmed and scrupulously clean, the food wholesome and the discipline firm but kind."

All Cheerful.

"I was impressed with the uniform cheerfulness of the inmates; it reminded me of the happiness of irresponsible children," he continued.

"When we went out to cut ice the chosen ones, they did not seem to wish alacrity. The thoughts of the prisoners seemed centred on getting out. They did not appear to be anxious for work. In fact, in the winter time our workhouse is a miser, through no fault of the officials. It is our leading place, our harbor and haven of rest for the derelict of society."

"If all the workhouses are conducted on the humane principles of the Toledo workhouse a workhouse sentence is not a harsh punishment. Time is the only thing we have in common, and I have my conviction that the equitable punishment for crime would be the abolition of fines and the imposing of imprisonment under the indeterminate sentence. Let the time for liberty depend upon the reformation of the prisoner."

Desire For Freedom Helps.

"The strong natural desire for freedom will give the incentive and furnish the hope for the desired reformation. It is rank folly to throw into a common prison the first offender, the vagrant, the drunkard and the hardened and confirmed criminal and expect a reformation. Your rotter apples will taint your whole barrel."

"In the workhouse I saw many men who were warmer, better fed and freer from care; in brief, better off than many an honest, poor man of family outside out of work and dependent upon a big game public charity for his support. I would not be less humane to the prisoner, but I would be more generous to the man who is willing to suffer and remain honest."

"The workhouse should have separate departments, the inmates classified and the different grades kept apart from one another. All should have to work. Promotion from a lower to a better grade should be made for good conduct, satisfactory work and proven betterment. Increase the privileges as the prisoner ascends in grade and at the end have your work farm and manual training department. Turn your prisoner out into the world able to do some honest work, get him a place to work or see that he has the means to live an honest life till he obtains employment and the great problem and danger of society, the recidivist, the constantly recurring criminal, will be in process of a rational solution."

Our Marines and Infantry Cover 25 Miles in Cabs in 10 Hours.

Havana.—Five companies of marines and three companies of the Twenty-seventh Infantry, proceeding for target practice to Guanajay, marched on Saturday twenty-five miles between 6 o'clock in the morning and 4 o'clock in the afternoon, with hourly halts of ten minutes and an hour for dinner. They traveled at the rate of a kilometer in ten and a half minutes, which is considered exceptionally good work for Americans in the tropics.

French Lecturer at Harvard.

Boston.—Andre Tardieu, editor of the Paris Temps, now delivering the series of lectures at Harvard, said: "War is imminent, but while I do not think that the present international conditions would permit Japan to rush into a war in the next three months with this country, I am certain that if an agreement governing Japanese immigration is not reached soon the little brown men will be quick to seize the opportunity to teach the proud Westerners a lesson."

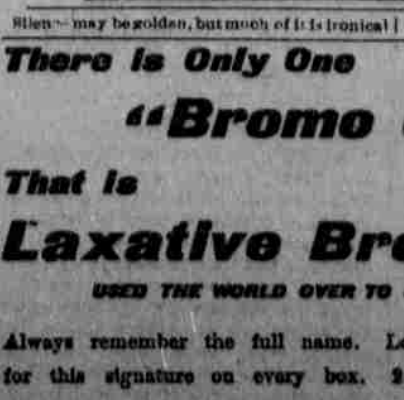
