way cases; that the prosecution of violations of the criminal law by the life insurance companies of New York, as disclosed by the Armstron committee, had been delayed; that an alleged criminal conspiracy to divert the property of the Metropolitan Street Rallway Company of New York into the hands of a few men was allowed by Mr. Jerome to go on hundreds of stockholders being robbed of their money, and that no attempt was made to punish men alleged to have committed other frauds connection with New York city traction deals.

Jerome's statements as to Mr. judges are alleged to have been not only improper but scandalous in their nature, and to have tended to de stroy the confidence of the people the integrity of their courts. R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Trade Review says:

While collections continue to be generally poor, there are some signs that the business situation is improving and the jobbing demand is gradually getting back to normal proportions. Monetary conditions seem to be slowly adjusting themselves, although rates of interest are at the maximum, and banks are more conservative in regard to renewals of paper than for some years past.

Sales of clothing at wholesale show a loss when compared with last year at this season, when the demand was exceptional. Some manufacturers look for an improved late busi-
