There are 286,902 persons in the nation's executive civil service, exclusive of persons in the consular and diplomatic service. Excluding from its computations some 60,000 postmasters, 18,000 mechanics and laborers in navy yards, and 12,850 clerks in post-offices not having free delivery, the census bureau gives interesting details about the rest, 185,874 persons. Of this number, about 14,000 are women; 8352 negroes, 1725 Indians, 1047 Filipinos, 142 Chinese and 62 Japanese.

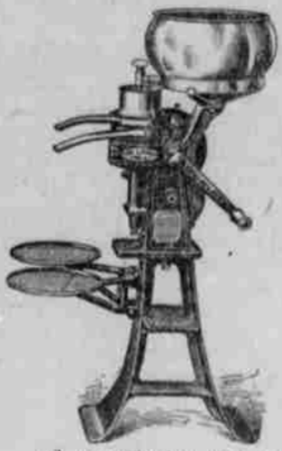
