WINTER RETURNS IN WEST.

Street Cars Held Up and Immense Damage done to Fruit.

St. Paul, April 27.—The latest severe snowstorm ever known here was experienced by this city and the surrounding country to-day. During the early hours the snow was so deep in the streets that car service was materially delayed. Heavy snow also fell at Superior, Wis., that section of the country experiencing one of the deepest falls of the winter.

Denver, April 27.—The damage by frost the past two nights to the orchards in the Arkansas and Grand Valley and other fruit-growing regions of Colorado, is estimated at \$1,000,000. In Nebraska the minimum temperature dropped to 29 last night, accompanied in some parts of the State by a killing frost. Intermittent snow fell throughout the northern part of the State and continued to-day.

Sedalia, Mo., April 27.—There was a light fall of snow here and in the central part of Missouri early to-day.

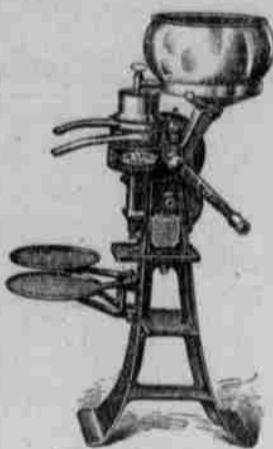
