Wheat, including flour, exports from the United States and Canada for the week ending April 30, are the smallest for two years, aggregating 1,620,589 bushels, against 2,417,003 last week, 2,234,756 this week last year, and 5,308,155 in 1902.

For the forty-four weeks of the fiscal year the exports are 178,417,285 bushels, against 143,800,621 in 1906-07, and 215,127,035 in 1901-02. Corn exports for the week are 407,002 bushels, against 371,347 last week and 1,817,695 in 1907.

For the fiscal year to date the exports are 44,022,407 bushels, against 61,428,937 in 1906-07.
