Business failures in the United States for the week ending April 30th number 282, against 254 last week, 163 in the like week of 1907 139 in 1906, 193 in 1905, and 176 in 1904. Canadian failures for the week number 22, as against 36 last week and 18 in this week a year ago.

Wheat, including flour, exports from the United States and Canada for the week ending April 80, are the smallest for two years, aggregating 1,620,589 bushels, against 2,417,003 last week, 2,234,-756 this week last year, and 5,-308,155 in 1902. For the fortyfour weeks of the fiscal year the exports are 178,417,285 bushels, against 143,800,621 in 1906-07, and 215,127,085 in 1901-02. Corn exports for the week are 407,002 bushels, against 371,347 last week and 1,817,695 in 1907. For the tiscal year to date the exports are 44.022.407 bushels, against 61,-428,937 in 1906-07.
