A JOINT RESOLUTION

reposing amondments to the Congritu-tion of the Commonwealth of Pennsyl-vania so as to consolidate the courts of vania so as to consolidate the courts of common pleas of Philadelphia and Alle-ghedy counties, and to give the General Assembly power to establish a separate court in Philadelphia county, with crim-inal and misocillaneous jorisidetion. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly met, That the following amend-menta to the Constitution of Penesylva-pia be, and the same are hereby, pro-posed in accordance with the eighteenth article thereoft. That section aix of article five be amend-

That section six of article five be amended by striking out the sold section and inserting in place thereof the following: Section 4. In the counties of Philadel-Section 6. In the counties of Philadel-phia and Alloghony all the jorisdiction and powers now vested in the suveral numbered courts of common pleas shall be vested in one court of common pleas in each of said counties, composed of all the judges in commission in said courts. Such jurisdiction and powers shall ex-tend to all proceedings at law and in equity which shall have been instituted in the several numbered courts, and shall be subject to such changes as may be In the several numbered course, and show be subject to such changes as may be finds by law, and subject to change o votue as provided by law. The presiden judge of each of the mild courts shall be selected as provided by law. The number of judges in each of suid courts may be by law, increased from time to time. This standament shall take effect on the first Monday of January succeeding its adop-

Section 2. That article five, section eight, be amended by making an addition thereto so that the same shall read as

follows: Section 8. The said courts in the com-ties of Philhadelphia and Allegheny ro-spectively shall, from time to time. In turn, defail one or more of their judges to hold the courts of quarter assaints of the pence of said counties, in such manner as may be directed by law: Provided. That in the courty of Philadelphia the General Amonbity shall have power to establish a separate court, consisting of not more than four judges, which shall have ex-clusive jurisdiction in criminal cases and is such other matters as may be provid-ed by law.


