A MENDMENT TO THE CONSTITU-ENS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH FOR THEIR APPROVAL OR REJECTION AT THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENN-JILVANIA, PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COM-MONWEALTH, IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITU-TION.

A JOINT RESOLUTION tion of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania so as to consolidate the courts of common pleas of Philadelphia and Allegheny counties, and to give the General Assembly power to establish a separate court in Philadelphia county, with criminal and miscellaneous forisdiction. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly met. That the following amendments to the Constitution of Fennsylvania be, and the same are hereby, proposed in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:—
That section six of article five be amend-

inserting in place thereof the following:
Section 6. In the counties of Philadel-Section 6. In the counties of Philadelphia and Aliegheny all the Jurisdiction and powers new vested in the several numbered courts of common pleas, shall be vested in one court of common pleas in each of said counties, composed of all the judges in commission in said courts. Such jurisdiction and powers shall extend to all proceedings at law and in equity which shall have been instituted in the several numbered courts, and shall be subject to such changes as may be made by law, and subject to change of venue as provided by law. The precident judge of each of the said courts shall be selected as provided by law. The number selected as provided by law. The number of judges in each of said courts may be, by law, increased from time to time. This amendment shall take effect on the first Monday of January succeeding its adop-
