Preliminary Meeting.
 The preliminary meeting of the teachers of Ayr, Belfast, Brush Creek and Licking Creek townships, was held at Needmore, September 1st. About thirty-three teachers were present. The meeting was called to order by Superintendent Lamberson, and Thomas Trux was appointed chairman. The following questions were discussed by the teachers, Prof. Palmer, and Superintendent Lamberson: 1. Preliminary Work. 2. Libraries: Their importance; Methods of establishing them, etc. High class works should be procured for the advanced grades. 3. How should a teacher spend his time when not engaged in actual teaching? Teachers should take some exercise between four and seven o'clock in the evening. 4. The value of a good school to a community and vice versa. Prof. Palmer said that teachers should look out for bad behavior outside of school. Discipline stands first in a good school. The best of discipline is reached through good teaching. 5. What should a teacher read? Make a study of poetry with the pupils. Study and apply psychology while teaching. 6. The teacher's opportunity for improvement. More time must be spent by the teacher in the study of Algebra. Committees were appointed to carry on the local institute work in the different townships. The committees were as follows: Ayr—President, Harry Bivens; Vice President, Rhoda Kendall; Secretary, Alice Hays. Belfast—President, S. L. Wink; Vice President, Pearl Mellott; Secretary, Blanche Smith. Licking Creek—President, H. O. Wible; Vice President, Loy Hollinshead; Secretary, Maude Deshong. Brush Creek—President, S. E. Walters; Vice President, Albert Spade; Secretary, Ada Barton.
