FORTY FOOT FOSSIL FOUND.

Complete Tyrannosaurus Rex Now For American Natural History Museum.

New York City.—Dr. Henry Fairfield Osborn, president of the American Museum of Natural History, received word from Great Falls, Minn., that a research party from the museum, headed by Barnum Brown, had discovered part of the skeleton of a Tyrannosaurus rex, a prehistoric animal...

The fossil, which is forty feet long and twenty-two feet high, has a perforation at the entire set of ribs, back bone and hip girdle and practically supplements the specimen discovered in the same section in 1902.

nosaurus rex is called, was found, research parties from the American Museum have been searching through the Bad Lands for a specimen that would complete the missing parts. The first fossil had good hind limbs but incomplete back bones. Dr. Osborn said that he believed the two specimens are about the same size and that the museum will now be enabled to mount the animal complete.

During the five years of search fragments of Tyrannosaurus rex have been found from time to time. Dr. Osborn said zoologists would be highly elated over this second discovery.

Rare Curio From Forbidden City. Dr. Hermon C. Bumpus, director of the American Museum of Natural History, announces the acquisition by the museum of an exceedingly rare Chinese curio from Kiching, the Forbidden City of Peking.
