Commission Hears Some Radical Legislation Proposed by Secretary.

The Pennsylvania State Board of Game Commissioners met last Thursday afternoon at its office in Harrisburg to consider legislation proposed by the State Sportsmen's Association at its meeting in Bradford last summer and to hear the report of Secretary Kalbfus.

In his report Dr. Kalbfus recommends the codification of all game laws under one title, such as is proposed to be done with the fish laws at the next meeting of the Legislature, and the wiping from the statute books of certain existing game laws that tend to annoy hunters more than do them good. Another recommendation is the placing of certain birds like the dove on the protected list and taking them out of the list of game birds on the ground that they are of use to the farmer. A third recommendation is that the open season for hunting in this State shall be from November 1 to December 15, and that all gunners shall be kept out of the woods outside of those dates. "This," said Dr. Kalbfus in explaining, "is for the purpose of preventing forest fires. It will keep all hunters out of the woods during October, when the woods are dry and careless hunters throw matches among the leaves after lighting their pipes, and do endless damage. Let them hunt in November, when the danger from forest fires has passed, and there will be very little destruction from fires."

Another recommendation from Secretary Kalbfus, which he will embody in a bill to be presented to the Legislature, is that no foreigner in Pennsylvania shall be allowed to own a gun. "I do this," said Dr. Kalbfus, "for the reason that I would deprive foreigners of the power to do wrong. Almost all of the violations of the game laws, the shooting of game wardens, the killing of song and insectivorous birds is done by foreigners who get hold of an old shotgun or a sawed-off musket and go out in the woods with little regard for the game laws and very little more for the lives of those who would prevent them from shooting."
