



On July 4, 1868, Vicksburg sur rendered to General Grant.

On the same day news was sent over the country that the Federal forces had won at Gettys burg.

On July 4, 1864, Grant was gradually driving Lee back, though at a terrific cost of human life.

On July 4, 1898, we got the news that Cervera's entire Span-Helman, H ish fleet had been destroyed off Fleming, R Santiago by the United States fleet, that 600 Spaniards had been killed and drowned and 1,400 taken prisoners on the day before.


