FATAL THUNDERBOLT.

Instantly Killed Isaac Fink Last Thursday Afternoon in His Barn on Pleasant Ridge.

IN LICKING CREEK TOWNSHIP.

During a thunder shower that passed over Licking Creek township last Thursday afternoon, Isaac Fink, one of that township's oldest citizens, was struck by lightning and instantly killed. Mr. Fink owned the old Fink property on the Ridge, just south of the "Tommy Hessler" property, and since the death of his wife several years ago-not having any other family, he has had his home with Joseph B. Mellott's, about a half mile distant from the Fink property on an adjoining farm. He did not do any farming himself, but let out fields to neighbors to farm on shares. During the summer months he went to and fro between Mr. Mellott's and his farm several times almost every day; as he generally had a few sheep and some chickens to look after. The remains were removed to Mr. Mellott's that evening, and the funeral took place the next, day, services being conducted by Rev. J. C. Garland, and the body was laid to rest in the family burying ground on the Fink place beside the graves of his parents. Mr. Fink was aged 65 years and 2 days.
