It must be so applied as to come into contact with the bodies of the pests, or they will not be injured. Therefore, those within the curled leaves are safe as far as spraying is concerned, and the leaves concerned, and the leaves containing them should be picked off and destroyed by burning or dropping into oil.

The Apple Aphis is by far the most commonly reported pest at this time of year. However, it has reached its worst and will soon be leaving the apple leaves to migrate to the roots of grasses and grains, where it spends the summer. In fact, many leaves now show only its cast skins. Binan fot in Tomatoes. Binck rot is often very troublesome in our early tomatoes. A Georgia farmer says his early tomatoes brought 86 a bushel hast season, but most of his first crop was unmarketable op account of black rot spots.

We have not yet learned how to conmer this disease. Possibly we may heek it somewhat by frequent sprayg with bordeaux mixture, but our nain rollance must be found in allow ing free eleculation of air around the alant by supporting the vines in such a way as to hold the fruit up from the ground. Last season our tomatoes were free from rot or nearly so .- T. G. in Farm and Fireside.


