PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE NVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

Proposing amendments to sections eight and twenty-one of article four, sections eleven and twelve of article flue, sections two three, and fourteen of article eight, section one of article twelve, and sections two above of article fourteen, of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and providing a schedule for carrying the amendments into effect, Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following are proposed as amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in necondance with the provinces. sylvania, in accordance with the provi-

Amendment One-To Article Four, Sec-tion Eight, Section 2 Amend section eight of article four of the Constitution of Pennsylvania,

Schedule for the Amendments.

Section 12 That no inconvenience may arise from the changes in the Constitution of the Commonwealth, and in order to carry the same into complete operation, it is hereby declared that—

In the case of officers elected by the people, all terms of office fixed by act of Assembly at an odd number of years shall cach be lengthened one year, but the Legislature may change the length of the term, provided the terms for which such officers are elected shall always by for an even number of years.

The above extension of official terms shall not affect officers elected at the general election of one thousand nine hundred and eight; nor any city, ward, borough, township, or election fivision officers, whose terms of office, under existing law, end in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten.
