"Except as otherwise provided in the Constitution, justices of the peace or al dermen shall be elected in the several wards, districts becoming and towards. wards, districts, boroughs and townships at the time of the election of constables by the qualified electors thereof, in such mannor as shall be directed by law, and shall be commissioned by the Governor for a term of five years. No township ward, district or borough, shall set to the constability of the ward, district or borough shall elect more than two justices of the peace or alder-men without the consent of a majority of the qualified electors within such town ship, ward or borough; no per on shal be elected to such office unless he shal have resided within the township, borough ward or district for one year next preced ing his election. In cities containing over

fifty thousand inhabitants, not more that one alderman shall be elected in each ward or district, so as to read:—
Except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, justices of the pence of aldermen shall be elected in the several aldermen shall be elected in the several wards, districts, boroughs or townships, by the qualified electors thereof, at the municipal election, in such manner as shall be directed by law, and shall be comminisoned by the Governor for a term of six years. No township, ward district or borough shall elect more than two justices of the peace or aldermen without the consent of a majority of the qualified electors within such township, ward or borough; no person shall be elected to such office unless be shall have resided within the township, borough ward or district for one year next preceding his election. In cities containing over fifty thousand inhabitants, not more than one alderman shall be elected in each ward or district.

All city, ward, borough, and township officers helding office at the date of the approval of these amendments, whose terms of office may end in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, shall continue to hold their offices until the first Monday of December of that year.

All judges of the courts for the several judicial districts, and also all county officers, holding office at the date of the approval of these amendments, whose terms of office may end in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, shall continue to hold their offices until the first Monday of January, one thousand nine hundred and tweive.
