Higher Prices for Shoes.

From so good an authority as the Boot and Shoe Recorder, we learn that despite the fact that the manufacturers were successful in their campaign for free hides at the time the tariff bill was passed, there will be an increase in the price of shoes. This will be interesting, if not accept able, news for the consumer.

The highest price for hides ever known is now prevailing in this country. Calfskins, which have practically been on the free list always, cost more than at any time since the civil war.

The increased cost of calfskin uppers on a pair of shees will run from 8 to 12 cents; the increased cost of sole leather will add to the cost of shoes from 6 to 10 cents, to say nothing of the findings, even though there be no increase in the cost of labor.

The cause for this condition is attributed to the fact that the demand for leather exceeds the demand for beef, and we must wait for a change here before there will be any appreciable decrease in the cost of footwear. Hides are a by p oduct of the beef in dustry. Therefore, it would be in utter deflance of economic con ditions to expect cheaper leather when the world's demand for beef for food has not increased as rapidly as the population, nor as train and roach McConnellsburg in 2 rapidly as the demand for leath-
