GOD SAVE THE COMMONWEALTH.

PROCLAMATION. General Election.

WHEREAS, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled, "An act relating to the elections within this Commonwealth," passed the 19th day of June, Anno Domini 1907, and amended the 3rd day of June Anno Domini 1908, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within the Commonwealth to give public notice of the General Elections and in such notices to enumerate the officers to be elected and give a list of all the nominations made, and designate the place at which the election is to be held.

THE FIRST TUESDAY AFTER THE FIRST MONDAY OF NOVEMBER NEXT, BEING THE 23rd DAY OF THE MONTH

A General Election will be held at the several Election Districts established by law in said County, and as published below.

OFFICERS TO BE ELECTED.

One person to fill the office of State Treasurer of Pennsylvania.

One person to fill the office of Auditor General of Pennsylvania.

One person to fill the office of Judge of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

One person to fill the office of Jury Commissioner of Fulton county, Pennsylvania.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1 Shall Section Eight of Article Four of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

The Senate shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of two-thirds of all the members of the Senate, appoint a Secretary of the Commonwealth and an Attorney General during pleasure.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2 Shall Section Twenty-one of Article Four of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

The terms of the Secretary of Internal Affairs, the Auditor General, and the State Treasurer shall each be four years and they shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the State at general elections.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 3 Shall Section Eleven of Article Five of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

Except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, justices of the peace or aldermen shall be elected in the several wards, districts, boroughs or townships, by the qualified electors thereof, at the municipal election, in such manner as shall be directed by law, and shall be commissioned by the Governor for a term of six years.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 4 Shall Section Twelve of Article Five of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

In Philadelphia there shall be established, for each thirty thousand inhabitants, one court, not of record, of police and civil causes, with jurisdiction not exceeding one hundred dollars; such courts shall be held by magistrates whose term of office shall be six years, and they shall be elected on general ticket at the municipal election, by the qualified voters at large; and in the election of the said magistrates no voter shall vote for more than two-thirds of the number of persons to be elected, who must be one are to be chosen; they shall be compensated only by fixed salaries, to be paid by said county; and shall exercise such jurisdiction and criminal, except as herein provided, as is now exercised by aldermen, subject to such changes, not involving an increase of such jurisdiction, as may be made by law.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 5 Shall Section Two of Article Eight of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

The general election shall be held biennially on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November in each even-numbered year, but the political assembly may by law fix a different day, two-thirds of all the members of each House consenting thereto.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 6 Shall Section Three of Article Eight of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

All judges elected by the electors of the State at large may be elected at either a general or municipal election, as circumstances may require. All elections for judges of the several judicial districts, and for county, city, ward, borough, and township officers for regular terms of service, shall be held on the municipal election, namely, the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November in each odd-numbered year, but the General Assembly may by law fix a different day, two-thirds of all the members of each House consenting thereto.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 7 Shall Section Fourteen of Article Eight of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

District election boards shall consist of a judge and two inspectors, who shall be chosen biennially, by the citizens at the municipal election; but the General Assembly may require that the board be appointed in such manner as it may by law provide.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 8 Shall Section Two of Article Eight of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

The general election shall be held biennially on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November in each even-numbered year, but the political assembly may by law fix a different day, two-thirds of all the members of each House consenting thereto.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 9 Shall Section Two of Article Fourteen of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

County officers shall be elected at the municipal elections and shall hold their offices for the term of four years, beginning on the first Monday of January, next after their election, and until their successors shall be duly qualified; all vacancies not otherwise provided for, shall be filled in such manner as may be provided by law.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 10 Shall Section Seven of Article Fourteen of the Constitution be Amended so as to Read as Follows?

Three county commissioners and three county auditors shall be elected in each county where such officers are chosen. In the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and every fourth year thereafter; and in the election of said officers each qualified elector shall vote for no more than two persons, and the three persons having the highest number of votes shall be elected; any casual vacancy in the office of county commissioner or county auditor shall be filled by the court of common pleas of the county in which such vacancy shall occur, by the appointment of an elector of the proper county who shall have voted for the commissioner or auditor whose place is to be filled.

Section 12. That no inconvenience may arise from the changes in the Constitution of the Commonwealth, and in order to carry the same into complete operation, it is hereby declared that—

In the case of officers elected by the people, all terms of office fixed by act of Assembly, and all terms of office fixed by law, shall be lengthened one year, but the Legislature may change the length of the term, provided the terms for which such officers are elected shall always be for an even number of years.

The above extension of official terms shall not affect officers elected at the general election of one thousand nine hundred and eight; nor any city, ward, borough, township, or election division officers, whose terms of office, under existing law, end in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten.
