1. The name of the church shall be known as the Laurel Ridge Christian church; and the property to be deeded to, and owned by, the Rays Hill and Southern Pennsylvania Christian Conference.

2. That the church be used for religious services only, and that other religious denominations may have the privilege of holding religious services therein, when not occupied by the Christians, by obtaining consent from the local trustees.

Therefore, if these conditions meet your approval, we invite you all to meet with us in convention at Laurel Ridge schoolhouse on Saturday the 20th day of this present month, at 2 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of laying plans for building, &c.
