Profit in Orchard Culture.

As many owners of land are thinking of planting fruit trees this fall, the following taken from the correspondence of Professor H. A. Surface, of the Department of Agriculture, Harrisburg, State Zoologist, will be read by them with interest.

A professional man of Chambersburg wrote for information concerning the planting of an orchard, and among other things contained in his letter was the following:

"My soil is specially adapted to the peach, but apples also do very well and have the advantage of a longer season of harvesting. My professional duties render it almost impossible for me to take the time to handle and care for a peach orchard and crop as it should be done, and I do not want to plant a single tree that I feel I shall not have time to give some personal attention.

"I acknowledge your letter of recent date, concerning your orchard planting, and can say that it will be a good plan to plant your apple trees 38 or 40 feet apart, and also plant peach trees half way between them as hills.

"I agree with you that it is much better to have a small orchard, well cared for than a large one neglected. As to whether you grow apples or peaches, or both, will depend upon your own inclination in the matter, but your only trouble as to successful fruit growing will be the care of the orchard, with the paying of special attention to the suppression of pests. If you need help in this direction, we shall be glad to give it."


