"In reply to your recent letter asking whether bees clean out a tree before they swarm, or wheth er they and the queen go at ranbeg to say that it is now established that they are hable to do either. Sometimes the colony finds a place and even gets to work at cleaning the tree cavity before they swarm, but 1 think that they generally swarm and at once send out scouts and wait for these to return to the cluster with the information that they have found a place to which to go. If dissatisfied with this, they may remain there and send out scouts to dish out genuine winter weathagain to find a new place to which er, and it is now cold enough to they may go. I have known them to move two or three times. On the other hand, they sometimes will swarm and cluster, and for some reason remain, and dwindle away, or perhaps fly short dis tances and cluster again and
