At the College of Veterinary Medicine, University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, on February 2, 3 and 4, the joint meeting of the Pennsylvania Live Stock Breeders' Association and the Pennsylvania Dairy Union will be held. Sixty-two cash prizes are offered for corn. The Apple Exhibit of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Association has been secured. The Pennsylvania Agricultural College will make a display and demonstration. There will be a big butter, cheese and milk show. A notable show of horses, both stallions and geldings, will be held. McLaughlin Bros. Columbus, Ohio, will furnish a select lot of Percheron and French Coach stallions, and Belgians, Clydesdales, Shires, Suffolks, Arabians and Morgans will be shown. Cattle of leading beef and dairy breeds will be on hand. Cattle, sheep and swine will be used in demonstrations on foot and on the block, conducted by experts. Everything is free to the public.
