SAYS NEW YORK IS PASTORS' GRAVEYARD

Dr. Carter Tells His Congregation Clergymen Are Not Properly Encouraged in New York City—More Than Big Pay Needed.

New York City.—New York has been called "the graveyard of ministers," the Rev. Dr. William Carter told his congregation of the Madison Avenue Reformed Church at Fifty-seventh street, in a sermon on the "Lord's Prayer."

Dr. Carter discussed freely the difficulties of a minister in carrying on the work of a large church with its many exactions and the conditions of life surrounding him. He did not mince words. "Too much criticism," he said, "has been and is being directed against pastors. Perhaps," he suggested, "it might be well to turn the criticism the other way and let the members of the congregation as well as the large number of church members who are seldom seen in their pulpits ask themselves honestly if they are trying to give the encouragement and aid to the pastor so much needed for successful work."

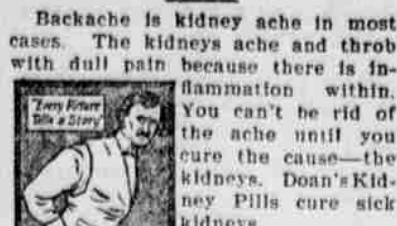
De Castellane's Parents Sue Princess De Sagan.
