M. S. WILT. Michael S. Wilt, a well known and popular hotel man in the upper end of the County for almost half a century, died at his home at Fort Littleion at an early hour last Sunday morning, of a complication of diseases incident to advanced age. Funeral took place Tuesday, and interment was made in the cemetery at Fort Lit tleton.

"Uncle Mike," as he was familiarly and affectionately known for many years, was born in York county, Pa., May 15, 1826; hence was aged at the time of his death, 83 years, 10 months, and 12 days.

Mr. Wilt was married to his brother's widow, Mrs. Emma Wilt, in 1863, and embarked in the hotel business at Burnt Cabins in the same year. In 1867, he purchased what is now known as the Wilt hotel property at Fort Littleton, took possession of it, and continued in business until a health for a period of several tew years ago, when he built a nice residence and retired from the hotel business.

For forty-five years, he was an active member of Fort Littleton Lodge, I. O. O. F., and most of that time served as its treasurer. Besides his widow, one child survives, Mr. D. K. Wilt, of Fort Littleton. Mrs. Bertha Bare is a daughter of Mrs. Wilt by her first husband.

By the death of Mr. Wilt, the community has lost a genial kindhearted citizen.
